We installed one in Garrison, Westchester County, and the teenage daughter came over while we were working and really couldn't care less about the pond. The week after we finished it, her mother called to tell me that the teen (had) moved her bedroom ... just so that she could hear the water running."

Ponds use liners or clay

The vast majority of ponds Schoen installs include liners, but occasionally, he will use clay. The size of a water feature can also vary — from a small backyard display to one that takes up more than an acre.

The possibilities of enhancing a space with a pond are endless.

"We're working on a project ... now that is a 70-foot clav pond, indoors on the second floor of a building," Schoen said. "But installing a pond is not something that is limited to ultra-wealthy people. People can start with a whiskey barrel in

their backyard, and in reality you can have some beautiful plants and a goldfish or two. But it's kind of like aquariums in the sense that it's harder to take care of a five-gallon aquarium than it is a 100-gallon aquarium."

Given a larger base to work with, temperature levels won't vary as much and fish can swim more freely in a larger environment.

"My original business was putting in organic vegetables for second-home owners in the area," he said. "I'd put in a garden, harvest it (and) take care of it ... for people, and they'd see all the vegetables but never see me."

"I feel very strongly about not selling chemical pest control or fertilizers at the store," he said. "As for the workshops, it's really nice that people want to learn something rather than to just grow a garden without any knowledge and relying on what you to tell them in 10 minutes."
